How Scope Started

The first meeting was held in Ipswich on 31th July 1977 and was attended by women from Northern N.S.W, Darling Downs, North to Rockhampton and Brisbane area. The outcome of it was that the Southern group decided that they wanted to form an organisation with a very simple structure, that would make it easy for each member to be involved in the decision making.

Suggestions were sought for the all-important name.

The Southern Steering Committee was elected at the meeting.

Jan George (Warwick) was Chairperson, with committee comprising Nell Rauchle (Wynnum), Ruth Lord (Nambour), Margaret Newman (Mt Gravatt) and Betty Bailey (Wynnum).

Nell Rauchle travelled to Innisfail to attend the meeting of the groups from Townsville to Cairns.

Out of the meeting came the eventual name for the organisation – SCOPE – suggested by Ann Moore of Cairns Club. The name of the Magazine – Tell-A-Scope was arrived at during a post discussion between Annette Anderson and Nell Rauchle.

The Northern Steering Committee as elected was Annette Anderson Innisfail (Chairperson), with Jan Hampton (Cairns), Maureen Raddatz (Babinda), Del Edwards (Sth. Johnstone), Joan White (Townsville) and Lorraine Raumer (Ingham).

It is important to remember that during this time of some turmoil and decision, clubs were still meeting. SCOPE clubs became centred around the Far North, Rockhampton-Gladstone area, Darling Downs, the Brisbane area and in Northern NSW.

Rockhampton Meeting

Now that the decision to form a new organisation had been taken, a meeting was called of all interested members for 1-2 October 1977 in Rockhampton.

Fifty-one members were present, representing eleven clubs. With apologies from a further five clubs.

During the afternoon, the Constitution was discussed, and agreement reached. The Southern Steering Committee, in conjunction with a solicitor of the Crown Law Office, and the Justice Department had prepared a draft of the Constitution. Nell Rauchle worked tirelessly to have the draft prepared prior to this meeting.

It was decided that the SCOPE year for clubs should run 1st August – 31st July.

National Conference would be held on the Queen's Birthday weekend and Zone Conference would be in September / October.

The colours were selected from six combinations submitted, and are Green Gold and White.

The badge design submitted by Lester Batzloff, Toowoomba was chosen.

This badge was adopted with President and Past President rings after the first National Conference, and has remained in use. One of the other designs, submitted by John Tonks, Wynnum, was use for the pendant badge of the National President, with smaller version being worn be the Past National Presidents.

Gladstone was chosen as the venue for the 1st National Conference, to be held on Queen's Birthday weekend in 1978, when the first National Executive would be elected. It was agreed that the 2nd National Conference would be held in Cairns.

Personal development programmes have remained a very strong facet of SCOPE activities, with every second club meeting, and part of every Zone and National Conference being devoted to such programmes.

Charter Clubs of The National Association Of Scope Clubs

Cairns, Babinda, Innisfail, South Johnstone, Ingham, Townsville, Rockhampton, Gladstone, Albany Creek, Wynnum, Allora, Warwick, Toowoomba, Lismore. A new club was formed in Quilpie early in 1978, and this brought to 16 and to 250 members in the Association as at the First National Conference in June 1978.

Structure

The organisation structure of the Scope Clubs of Australia is

Zone

During the initial period, the border between the two Zones was Sarina in the South and West to the N.T. border. However, in 1981 at National Conference, Zone Three was formed. The boundaries of Zone Three were Proserpine south to Gladstone and West to Queensland / N.T. border.

National Council of Women

In 1978, following the National Conference, application was made to join the National Council of Women. Scope has been an active member of the Council ever since. Margaret Newman was the first Scope representative. Zita Sidaway, Pam Alexander, Norma Powe, Dot Reed, Kate Van Der Muelen, Jill Leeson and Annabelle Silvester have been Scope delegates over the years.

Name Change

1985 The name of the NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF SCOPE CLUBS was changed to SCOPE CLUBS OF AUSTRALIA at the Toowoomba National Conference.

1986-87 The organisation became INCORPORATED as SCOPE CLUBS OF AUSTRALIA INC.


